The University of Pittsburgh has worked to address these barriers through the Horizon Scholars Program, which provides support for students with experience in the child welfare system on their journey to and through college. The program offers mentorship, college exploration and academic support, resource navigation and more. By providing a stable support network, The Horizon Scholars Program aims to reduce barriers and improve educational outcomes for youth with experience in the child welfare system. In this session, we'll explore the key elements across the Pre-college and Pitt Horizon Scholars program including program components, building community partnerships, and opportunities for educators and institutions to provide support to this group of students on their journey to and through college.

## Our Path Forward: Exploring How CBOs Partner with Underrepresented Youth to Support their Post-Secondary Decision-Making Hall 3

Navigating postsecondary educational opportunities is often a complex process that requires immense guidance and support in order to find, apply, and enroll in post-secondary institutions. Furthermore, students are tasked with finding and aligning the appropriate educational pursuit with their interests, where these decisions have serious implications for their futures. However, low-income students, particularly for youth of color, rarely completed these programs, leading to heavy debt and limited employment opportunities (Deming et al., 2012; Holland & DeLuca, 2016). However, community-based organizations have the potential to fill in the gaps within traditional education and support systems, where they have the capacity and flexibility to tailor individualized support to each student. Youth Enrichment Services (YES), a community-based nonprofit that provides youth with a wide range of programs to support positive development, is provided as one example of advocacy work that supports students during postsecondary education decision making. This workshop will create discussion around how YES and other CBOs can best counsel youth, and how these spaces can create informal mentorship relationships to serve as an intervention during post-secondary education selection.

As the national conversation shifts toward access and affordability, we must also navigate the shifting political climate and the significant changes in areas such as FAFSA & financial aid, application review processes post-SFFA decision, and recruitment strategies. These pressing issues are top priorities for educators, advocates, and policy makers alike. This session will provide a unique opportunity for participants to engage in an open discussion with four seasoned professionals, each with over a decade of experience in student recruitment, support services, advocacy, resource development, inclusive practices, and creating equitable educational experiences for prospective and current students. Together, they'll share insights from their work in the Pittsburgh region—highlighting the diverse challenges and opportunities both within the city of Pittsburgh, SW PA, and its surrounding communities. Representing a range of perspectives, the panelists bring expertise from a private high school, a community-based organization, a highly selective institution, and the broader Pittsburgh Public Schools system. This conversation will explore how educational leaders from these different sectors are working to serve students from a variety of backgrounds, including those from communities beyond the city of Pittsburgh, who often face distinct barriers to access and success in higher education. Join us to learn how we can collaborate across sectors to ensure that Pittsburgh's students—whether from the city or its neighboring regions—are supported in their journey to and through college.

# From High School to Higher Ed: Equipping Counselors for Student Success <u>Hall 4</u>

As a former college admissions director with eight years of experience at a top 100 research institution, I observed a disconnect between high school counselors and college admission representatives regarding admissions practices. As a former public high school teacher with twenty-one years of experience, I witnessed the uncertainty many students face when considering career paths and identifying the skills needed for life after high school. The goal of our session is to bridge gaps in awareness among counselors. This engaging one-hour workshop equips high school counselors and community-based organizations with actionable strategies and free resources to effectively guide students through the high school-to-college transition and career admission processes. Participants will receive a transformation guide template that can be used to support students interested in post-secondary opportunities. The guide will include a template for school selection, understanding financial aid, awareness of trade programs, and how to search for scholarships. The session will enhance the counselor's awareness of available resources to support all students and promote equitable practices for every learner.

#### Keynote Speaker: Alyssa Dobson



Alyssa Dobson is the Director of Financial Aid and Scholarships at Slippery Rock University. Slippery Rock is a part of the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education; a medium sized institution serving about 9,000 undergraduate and graduate students. She has worked in the field of higher education, financial aid specifically, for over 20 years. During this time, she has worked in the private and public sectors as well as career schools. She has experience advocating on Capitol Hill as well as with the negotiated rulemaking process. Alyssa is also currently on the Government Relations Committee for PASFAA (Pennsylvania Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators). She is also active within the Western Pennsylvania College Success Roundtable, and the "PA FAFSA Go"

movement, where she and her colleagues work toward smoothing the transition between high school and college for this region's most vulnerable populations. Through this latest transformation of the FAFSA form, she has come to realize the importance that the collective "we" have in this process, the bumpy road to higher education, and the profound impact we can have when we provide resources and access.
